Lyon: World heritage

A living work of art with more than 2000 years of history behind it, the city has a remarkable cultural heritage and no fewer than 500 hectares of the city centre have been registered as UNESCO world heritage.

The Capital of french cuisine

Lyon is a leader in the culinary arts. It has around 12 Michelin star-rated restaurants and more than 1600 restaurants in all, including 'Bouchons' (traditional restaurants) and bistros, etc.

A lively cultural scene

Lyon has numerous museums including the Lumière Museum (where cinematography was invented by the Lumière brothers) and the Museum of printing (in the XVth and XVIth century Lyon was a major city of the printing industry) always something going on, all year round, with examples being the biennial Contemporary art and Dance festivals and the Grand Lyon Film Festival.

An attractive shopping destination

In the city centre, the 'Carré d'Or' district offers a wealth of luxury brands (including Vuitton, Hermès, etc.) while further to the east, the Part-Dieu shopping centre is the largest in Europe with 230 stores.

A city of light

Thanks to a popular tradition, Lyon has enjoyed a very special relationship with light since December 8, 1852. This local festival has gone on to become an international event, today known as the Fête des Lumières (Festival of Light).
