PROPOSED FRAMEWORK TREATY ON LIBRARIES, ARCHIVES AND MUSEUMS

PROPOSAL FOR A FRAMEWORK TREATY ON COPYRIGHT EXCEPTIONS FOR LIBRARIES, ARCHIVES AND MUSEUMS (TLAM)

Preamble¹

The Contracting Parties,

- Considering that libraries, archives, and museums are distinctive guardians of the
 public trust, specifically designated worldwide as institutions necessary for serving the
 global public interest with regard to preserving the diverse forms of expression used by
 societies over time, for facilitating access to and dissemination of knowledge goods, and
 to further facilitate intellectual interchange accomplished primarily by means of literary,
 educational, scientific and cultural materials, analogue, digital or any other format to be
 known:
- 2) Aware of the critical role of libraries, archives, and museums in achieving the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals, particularly Goal 4 Quality Education, Goal 5 Gender Equality, Goal 9 Industry, Innovation, and Infrastructure and Goal 10 Reduced Inequalities:
- 3) Recognising that exceptions and limitations, which are an integral part of national copyright systems, play a critical role in enabling libraries, archives, and museums to meet the information the needs of the public, helping individuals to achieve their full potential and engage with others.
- 4) Recognising that exceptions and limitations for libraries, archives, and museums help these institutions to assist individuals in seeking, receiving and imparting information so that they may participate meaningfully in public life.
- 5) Recognising that exceptions and limitations also advance knowledge by preserving and providing access to the world's cultural, artistic, and scientific heritage.
- 6) Recognising that both affirmative protections for authors and exceptions and limitations, including those for library, archival and museum services, are vital to

- Encourage change at the national level
- Facilitate cross-border activities

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- cross-border uses of works
- library lending
- library document supply
- preservation of library and archival materials
- use of works for education, research and private study
- use of works for personal and private purposes
- orphan works
- obligation to respect contractual clauses overriding exceptions to copyright
- possibility to bypass technological protection measures that block use of exceptions
- limitation on liability for libraries and archives

The objective would be to consider the opportunities and challenges provided by various international solutions including soft law, contractual/licensing and normative approaches, as appropriate

Copyright for libraries in the Asia-Pacific region



- Countries with no E&Ls at all for libraries
 - Laos
 - Tuvalu
 - Yemen
- <u>Very few E&Ls</u> and other library provisions in most countries (out of 41)
 - Library lending: 1
 - Reproduction and supply: 6
 - Preservation: 25
 - Orphan works: 3
 - Translations: 1
 - Technological protection measures: 21. Only 3 exclude libraries
 - Limitation of liability: 1

Copyright for libraries in the Asia-Pacific region



- Provisions not adapted to the <u>digital world</u>
 - Limiting the number of copies for preservation (14 out of 25)
 - Reference to "works in the permanent collection"
 - "Reprographic" means of copying (or other limitation in format)
 - Transitory copies
 - Contract override
- Laws unchanged for over 20 years
 - Myanmar 1911
 - Iran and Iraq 1970
 - Yemen 1994
 - Brunei Darussalam, Fiji & Kuwait 1999
 - Papua New Guinea and Vanuatu 2000


